
Provinces as well as the American Province located in Elizabeth, PA, also attended as guests of honor.



Reaching Out With Love Christ the Divine Teacher **Catholic Academy** Aspinwall, PA

Chimbote, Peru, is known as one of the most poverty-stricken cities throughout the world. People everywhere have found the generosity to open doors for the Chimbote Mission. The Chimbote Mission is a way for people to come together to raise money to give to the needy families in Peru. The mission truly motivates many people, young and old, to make a difference, since every penny is worth a great deal in Chimbote.

By donating just three dollars to the mission, a year's worth of essential vitamins and mineral supplements are provided for a malnourished child. Twenty dollars helps to under-

write the cost of medical treatment for five people during an average week, while forty dollars underwrites the cost of medical treatment for ten people during an average day. A house costs about two hundred twenty-five dollars to build. This shows how much a loving heart contributes to life in Chimbote.

Through the many talks of helping to fund the mission, many school students all across the Diocese of Pittsburgh have shown interest in becoming involved. My school, Christ the Divine Teacher Catholic Academy, has especially felt the desire to give throughout the years.

Many Chimbote projects have become an exciting yearly tradition, starting off with our Movie Day. Children at our school pay one dollar to watch a movie that is being shown, as well as pay for healthy snacks to eat. All the money that is then collected at the end of the day is given to the Chimbote Mission. Students are also allowed to pay one dollar to dress down out of their uniforms during the day. This is a special fundraiser that has pushed the school to raise \$344.31 just last year.

Other fundraisers include the Kindergarten Pennies for Peru, in

which the kindergarten class brings in as many pennies as they can throughout a four-week period. The Fourth Grade also participates by having a Lenten change collection for Chimbote.

These activities are a great way for the students to get the chance to reach out and show kindness and love toward those who are in great need. I'm sure Chimbote truly appreciates the people who care for them, for they will know that they are in God's hands.

Lighting the Way Saint Elizabeth Catholic School Pleasant Hills, PA

Saint Elizabeth Elementary School, located in Pleasant Hills for 65 years, has long demonstrated an untiring commitment to philanthropy. Central to its mission and educational program, Saint Elizabeth School teaches the importance of caring for others. Echoing the call to "Light the Way," this year Saint Elizabeth's efforts extend to the responsibility of being global citizens. A yearlong service project focusing on the mission in Chimbote, Peru was launched in August 2007 and will continue until May 2008. The money raised will support the medical and educational

efforts of the missionaries who work with the disadvantaged families of Chimbote, Peru. The students have planned a number of activities which include bake sales and non-uniform day collections, a fund raising marathon sponsored by the Cross Country Team, Read for Chimbote which will involve collecting pledges for books read by the students throughout the year, a Sharing is Caring collection in the school cafeteria, and a Used Book Sale. Though no specific dollar goal has been set, the students have already raised almost \$4,000 for the Chimbote Foundation with three months to go! Among the highlights of the Year for Chimbote was the kick-off assembly

presented by Mike Clark of WTAE, who spreads the message of caring for others by recounting his own experiences in Chimbote. In October, Saint Elizabeth School presented its project at the annual Chimbote Dinner. The Cross Country Team answered the call to get involved by having each runner raise \$26 which represented \$1 for each mile of a symbolic Marathon for Chimbote. Their efforts alone raised over \$700. Yet to be completed is the Read for Chimbote Event and our Used Book Sale. A reasonable estimate for these efforts is \$1,000.

The tradition of service at Saint Elizabeth Elementary School invites

the students to do more than donate material goods. It calls them to realize that they are challenged as disciples of Jesus Christ to help build up the Kingdom of God here on earth by using their time, talent, and treasure to "Light the Way" by serving others.

The One Brick at a Time Saint Cyril of Alexandria School **Brighton Heights, PA**

From October 18 to 31 of last year, the Student Council of Saint Cyril of Alexandria School sold paper bricks to help build a hospital in Chimbote Peru. In the front window of the school, students built a model of a hospital brick by brick. Bricks cost \$1 and windows cost \$5.
